Time to Reflect

I recall observing a parishioner with a little ringbound pocket book, scribbling something down. I asked her what she was doing. "I've just remembered that I should pray for so-and-so", she replied, putting the book in her housecoat.

I was awed. Here was this lady, a regular attender at church, committing herself to do the most difficult aspect of prayer—to intercede. Difficult, for me anyway, because those long lists of names are dull to listen to, distracting because we find ourselves wondering why those names on the list and the whole business raises complicated questions about what we think God will do with these prayers anyway.

Intercessionary prayer, asking God to be with people and involved in situations, is often where we start; "God bless Mummy, Daddy, etc". We become more self-conscious about this as we grow up, more uncertain about what we are actually doing. Yet it is clear, in the scriptures, that the business of holding people and situations up to God is something that God longs for us to do. Our Gospel reading, although it explores other issues too (justice, faith), is a rallying call to us to be people of intercession; to carry our own pocket books as it were, to be faithful and persistent in our prayers.

As part of our Mission Action Planning, we are going to be using a prayer regularly in our worship, a prayer for ourselves and our parish. Like the widow, we are going to be persistent in our pleading before God.

A reading from the second letter of Paul to Timothy (2 Timothy 3.14 - 4.5)
