

A reading from the book of Revelation

(Revelation 5. 1-10)

Then I saw in the right hand of the one seated on the throne a scroll written on the inside and on the back, sealed with seven seals; and I saw a mighty angel proclaiming with a loud voice, "Who is worthy to open the scroll and break its seals?" And no one in heaven or on earth or under the earth was able to open the scroll or to look into it. And I began to weep bitterly because no one was found worthy to open the scroll or to look into it. Then one of the elders said to me, "Do not weep. See, the Lion of the tribe of Judah, the Root of David, has conquered, so that he can open the scroll and its seven seals." Then I saw between the throne and the four living creatures and among the elders a Lamb standing as if it had been slaughtered, having seven horns and seven eyes, which are the seven spirits of God sent out into all the earth. He went and took the scroll from the right hand of the one who was seated on the throne. When he had taken the scroll, the four living creatures and the twenty-four elders fell before the Lamb, each holding a harp and golden bowls full of incense, which are the prayers of the saints. They sing a new song: "You are worthy to take the scroll and to open its seals, for you were slaughtered and by your blood you ransomed for God saints from every tribe and language and people and nation; you have made them to be a kingdom and priests serving our God, and they will reign on earth."

Time to Reflect

A Reflection on Prophecy

In our Old Testament reading today we witness the debut of the Prophet Samuel. As debuts go, it is something of a baptism of fire: his first assignment, while still a young boy, is to tell his mentor Eli that his house is doomed on account of the blasphemy of his sons, and that there is nothing he can do to rectify the situation. This is perhaps the worst fate a man in the ancient world could face: typically, life was spent trying to secure the future for one's heirs- Eli's life is now wasted. To his credit, Eli simply accepts this, demonstrating, perhaps, both his innocence and his faith, in contrast to his sons.

The church struggles with Prophecy. Controversially, purported prophetic utterances have been weaponised dishonestly for political purposes. This has led to the insistence that prophecy ought to be uplifting, positive, and apolitical-but, inconveniently, Biblical prophecy is rarely like that. The whole debate, focussing as it does on what the content of genuine prophecy ought to be, misses the point- it is not the content of prophecy which validates it but its source: if God is the source then the content with be valid, whatever that content is, and this is precisely what is hard to prove except perhaps in hindsight. Better, perhaps, not to aspire to a prophet's calling at all- Samuel didn't- but rather to aspire to the gift of love, which is the greatest of all spiritual gifts.
